CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

2016 has been a difficult year for Maidstone Mencap (MMCT) with reduced funding and the roof expenditure being the biggest problems.

At the start of the year after a long and stressful tender procedure for 2 years funding from KCC for Holiday club, we were advised that we were not successful. This meant that a large portion of income was lost and we had to decide whether we could continue the club for certain ages. Fortunately with careful planning we were able to run the club and our thanks go to all those responsible for ensuring this happened, particularly Susan, Liane and Sarah. Thanks must also go to Marie for her great efforts in trying to secure the tender as it was through no fault on her behalf that we were unsuccessful.

The roof repairs have now been completed and have left the building looking fantastic and most importantly safe for our users. The repairs started in April but had to be put on hold in order to assess whether bats were using the roof for nesting. Lloyd Bore kindly provided their services and the necessary survey which involved checking for bat activity at different times in the day. Fortunately we had only one nesting area and this was avoided during the remainder of the repairs which involved replacing damaged or broken guttering and tiles. Also dangerous portions of stonework were removed and replaced where necessary. Our thanks go to AT Palmer who did a fantastic job and ensured that costs were well below the original budget, which greatly assisted MMCT as we were unable to obtain grants to cover all the costs meaning that our reserves took a big hit. Also thanks go to Lloyd Bore for providing their advice and ecology services at a minimum cost.

In June Marie Tomblin stepped down as Clubs Manager but fortunately we managed to persuade her to continue with the funding applications, one day a week. Thanks to Marie we have continued to receive grants and funding from a large number of providers e.g. Clothworkers, KCC, Baily Thomas, Bernard Sunley, Jewson and various others. We thank them all for their kind donations and support.

Following Marie's move, Liane became the overall Manager of Clubs, including Playschool; this has ensured there is a seamless transition between each club. Susan O'Connor has supported this change with her Supervisor role in juniors, Holiday Club and Youth club, ensuring that the clubs have had consistent leadership and planning.

It is with sadness we say goodbye to Pat Wilmshurst who has finally retired from her role as one of our Vice chairs. As you will be aware Pat has been involved with Maidstone Mencap since its start, many years ago, in various different roles with her most recent being Vice President following her run as President until 2012. We would like to thank Pat for all her hard work over the years, she has been a fantastic support, we will miss her but we wish her well in the future and in her new home.

With the building works behind us we have further challenges ahead in 2017, with changes due in other Playschool settings that are likely to impact on our service, together with the need to find other income sources to enable our services to continue in the future.

FINANCIAL REPORT 2016

PLAYSCHOOL

Cobtree Playschool has continued to be reflective in its practices to ensure we maintain our caring and nurturing ethos for the children and their families in our setting.

Children deserve the best possible start in their lives to enable them to reach their true potential and the early experiences they receive between the birth and five have a major impact on the future life chances. We have this year, continued to provide the quality and consistency of care that supports each child to make good progress. With the support from fundraising and donations from families and others we have managed to develop our resources to establish a more enabling environment, with stimulating and accessible layouts that support the children to play and explore, to be involved and motivated and to be creative and imaginative. Staff roles have developed to utilise their qualifications and strengths, supporting their role as a "key person" for the children, enabling planning strategies and targets for each unique child to be challenging and playful, supporting their individual learning and development even more effectively.

Playschool has a wonderful and dedicated team of staff, volunteers and helpers who have all worked so hard to ensure that they can fulfil the new routines and requirements within the development of their roles. It has been a privilege to work alongside them, absorbing their knowledge and kindness with the children, which continues to embed the ethos of the Playschool. Thank you never seems to be a big enough word for all that they do and with their kind help and support I can look forward to the continuing development of the Playschool for the current and the future children entrusted to our care.

Working together with families and outside support agencies to promote the learning and development of all the children, their achievements are clearly evidenced in the progress each child is making in our care. The children are happy and settled, are involved in a broad range of planned and spontaneous activities, all supporting their individual development and overall learning. The children are confident to explore and investigate the opportunities and experiences planned for them feeling safe and secure in the care we give.

I also must say a huge thankyou to our families, parents, and carers. We have had some wonderful donations to support the work that we do here at Playschool with their golf days, marathon running, company evenings just to highlight some of the support given to raise funds on our behalf of our provision.

We have had many visitors during the year and we continue to work alongside the Children's individual therapy teams, our KCC Welfare, Inclusion and Setting Improvement Partners, and other support networks including Portage, and other Settings. Working together and sharing information, we will give the children and their parents the best possible start in life; the support and experiences we give, will enable them to reach their true

potential and provide the right foundation for good future progress through school and life. With this integrated approach the children's individual needs can be met through focused planning, which will make a difference. Our waiting list of children continues to evolve; we are constantly reflecting our practices and support, to review our registers for the start of each new term to see if there is any possible way to support these families. We continue to show young children and their parents around our playschool every month. By word of mouth and reputation families have been recommended to visit and are becoming more aware of the care and support our Setting can provide. As a team we need to look at our sustainability to ensure we are able to continue to offer such a valuable service to our community for many years to come with volunteers still needed to maintain our ethos and high standards of care.

We continue to be grateful to all for the support given by the fundraising team and the hard work and commitment needed to run their planned events, to all our staff and helpers for the help in making costumes, running stalls and the delicious tea and cakes provided at these times, helping making them successful and well attended days. We are fortunate to continue to have donations from Pauline Easter for all her beautiful crafts and from Sandra Collins and her Yoga ladies on Monday nights. With all this support, we have managed to have some special days for the children, Zoo lab came in to surprise the children with the Creepy Crawlies, a lovely sensory experience for all. We also had a trip out to the Rare Breeds Centre, with the cost of the coach supported by The Happy Days charity and a summer picnic for all our families to celebrate the end of term and the children moving onto "big school."

At Christmas we were able to take the children see Santa and his reindeer at Notcutts. It is such a nice outing watching the children as they see all the wonders of the Christmas lights and the winter wonderland before coming across Santa in his Grotto. We thank the Scottish Dancers' for their continuing support Their very generous gift enabled us to have this wonderful day, plus give presents to all the children, have a Christmas party buffet and a Father Christmas visit to the hall. December is such a special month for the children and their families and includes our Nativity which is well supported by all, with Mayors, dignitaries, parents and grandparents all singing and clapping along. A huge thank you has to go to all our volunteers and staff in providing the props, practicing the songs and supporting the children throughout. A huge effort is put in the costumes and scenery so a very special thank you to Rita for all that she does.

I look forward to our new year, supporting and caring for each unique child. I know that they will all thrive under the care and opportunities given from the dedicated team at Playschool.

JUNIOR GATEWAY & HOLIDAY CLUB REPORT

Juniors continue to run on Saturday mornings during term time, supporting children 5-11 and 11-16. We have a wonderful dedicated team of helpers, whose commitment to the children in our care having fun and social interactions, has proved to be a great asset to the service that we provide. It is great to hear feedback from parents, when they say it is like socialising with your friends and not just being with your carer.

In September, we welcomed our new manager, Rebecca, who has settled well into her role with the support from our team.

During the summer, we ran our Holiday Club for 4 weeks over August, providing respite for the families of over 40 children and young adults between the ages of 5-18. The children's days included opportunities for swimming, trips out to the miniature railway, Kent Life and Tyland Barn. We had visits from the fire brigade with their engines and Art of Mine when the children created some lovely pottery tiles which will be used to make a picture display for our hall.

We had a fantastic management team who ensure that the children's days were full of fun, activities, and social interactions, all supported by a large team of helpers, who provided the 1:1 care, many of whom were familiar with the children and the families from volunteering with us for our Junior Club. A huge thank you must go out to all for the commitment, time and hard work given to make our holiday club so successful. Sharing their knowledge of the children, the techniques and strategies needed to help keep them entertained happy and motivated, made the children feel safe and confident to explore all the opportunities and experiences we could provide for them. Photographs taken throughout the summer show the huge smiles reinforcing the fun they had.

This Ethos continues to be embedded in our Junior Clubs throughout the year, for which Maidstone Mencap is very proud.

YOUTH CLUB

Youth Club is running on twice a month on Thursday evenings, supporting young adults from 16-25. Susan and her support team of carers take them out to the Trampoline Park, swimming, bowling, having a meal and drink afterwards, or alternatively when in the hall, they cook together, play on the computer, dance, paint and generally have a fun social time together.

Again, a huge thank you must go to all the staff, for the time and commitment that goes to organising and planning these events. The young adults in their care are being given some wonderful experiences and opportunities within our community supported by the trusting and caring relationships that they have developed with our team. They are building on their confidence to try new things, to interact with their peers engaging and understanding that during their time with us their individual needs are being met. This all supports the foundations needed for them to make a positive contribution in the decision making and positive behaviours needed in the rules of being together in our community.

In addition to some financial support from the Disabled Commissioning Service, this year we have had some kind donations to help support the activities and resources needed to provide these opportunities for the children using our service provision, including those from the Morrison's Foundation, Albert Hunt Trust, Alchemy Foundation, Archer Trust, Golding Homes Community Chest and the Linda Hogan Community Fund. For these we say thank you. Any donations, however small, go a long way in sustaining the variety and quality of experiences we can provide.

BUILDING REPORT

Restoration Works to Premises in 2016

The year was spent fundraising for much needed roof repairs and stone restoration work. Local construction company AT Palmers Ltd undertook the majority of works and now the old building looks almost as good as new.

Phase 1 of restoration ran from April to June and began with the erection of high level scaffolding to the garden end and rear of the building. Repairs were made to the stone walls requiring new dressed local rag stone to be laid in lime mortar. Damaged and eroded copings and decorative stone coining's were repaired or replaced. The leaking roof was repaired and a new ridge laid. New gutters and downpipes were fitted. Timber repairs were carried out and some external windows decorated.

Works then paused for the Summer Fayre and Summer Club. During the summer break we took the opportunity to bring in the expertise of Lloyd Bore Ecologists (in a voluntary capacity) who carried out 3 bat surveys. The surveys found only one roost of the Common Pipistrelle Bat, meaning there was no need to follow up these surveys with a Bat Licence for the premises.

Phase 2 ran from September to November and began with the erection of high level scaffolding to the rear and hip end of the property, as well as a low-level scaffold to the front. This phase saw a huge amount of restoration work to the roof including a new ridge to the main roof, a deep clean of the tiles (mostly to the main front elevation) and replacement of thousands of faulty or broken tiles (mostly needed to the main rear elevation). AT Palmers also repaired some large stones to the front and side of the building, painted windows to the hip end, cleaned all Perspex window covers, treated all wooden window frames and attached snow guards around the property. The ornate hip end roof required some work to each vertical ridge to make them safe from falling tiles. There were many areas across the rooves where the previous repairs had been undertaken with the wrong materials or using poor techniques, meaning Palmers had to undo these mistakes before making the repairs. The Palmers team worked tirelessly and with very minimal disturbance to our services at the Hall.

Lloyd Bore oversaw the works in Phase 2 to ensure no other bats were found when the roof tiles were removed or replaced. As advised by Lloyd Bore, AT Palmers Ltd has created new bat roosting areas in the roof as part of the restoration work.

Lloyd Bore and AT Palmers have worked sympathetically to our budget, building and many constraints in time scale and working hours, due to the use and situation of our building. We are pleased that due to the efforts of AT Palmer Ltd and the generosity of Lloyd Bore the total project cost came in under budget at £62,236.30 including VAT.

Planned/ Required Works for 2017

- Some internal decoration is required to repair and cover old damp patches. These are most noticeably in the children's cloakroom and mezzanine. Estimated Cost under £1000
- We hope to install a new wet room/ bathroom facility suitable for our Service Users at some point, depending on funds we raise specifically for this project. Estimated Cost at least £15,000.
